## **My Heroes**

#### George Washington Carver

Little George was born a slave in 1864 but was kidnapped when he was about two months old. He was found and sent to live on the Carver plantation and raised by his aunt. George was taught to garden, spin, knit, and dye cloth by his aunt. He attended a one-room schoolhouse run by the Freedmen's Bureau.

When he was 10, he was on his own and had to work to live and go to school. He started his own business, a laundry. His only name was George so he took Washington from the first president and Carver from Moses Carver who owned the plantation that took him in. George wanted to go to college. He sold his laundry and walked 25 miles to Simpson College. He moved to Iowa State College and studied science and nature. In 1896, he accepted an offer to teach at Tuskegee as professor of scientific agriculture and dairy science. He taught and worked in his lab for 37 years. He discovered new products from peanuts, sweet potatoes, and soybeans. Farmers could then grow these crops instead of cotton.

#### Julia S. Tutwiler

Julia, called "Angel of the Prisons," spent her life working to help women and prisoners. She was unusual for her time because her father wanted her to be educated. She attended boarding school and Vassar College. She even studied in Germany. As she traveled around Europe, she became homesick for Alabama. She wrote the poem "Alabama," which became the state song.

She worked tirelessly for the education of women. She was president at Alabama Normal College for Girls in Livingston, which is now the University of West Alabama. She gave speeches for a vocational school for women in Montgomery. She fought for the right of women to attend the University of Alabama. Women were first allowed to attend in 1893.

Prisons were in terrible shape at this time. Julia worked to separate boys and men in prison. She worked for safe drinking water, clean toilets, and heat. Because of her, a Prison Board was set up to see that the jails and prisons improved.
