Key Events Leading to U.S. Entry Into World War II, page 114

Emergence of military dictators: The dictators threatened peace around the world.

The Treatment of Germany: Germany was treated very harshly after World War I. This was a blow to their national morale, and the reparations they had to pay ruined their economy.

Japanese expansion in Asia: Beginning with their takeover of Manchuria (part of China), Japan invaded many parts of Asia (key Chinese cities, Indochina). Could territories of the U.S. be next? **U.S. dependence on global trade:** Our economy needed outside markets to purchase the goods we produced.

The 1939 German invasion of Poland: European countries were our friends and allies and trading partners. They were also the ancestral homes of many Americans. A German takeover of more and more European countries would create a new order in the world that would be very unfavorable to us.

The Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor: The surprise attack on our own territory finally propelled us into war.

- 1. in general, a thorough destruction involving extensive loss of life; in particular, the mass slaughter of European civilians, especially Jews, by the Nazis during World War II.
- 2. the disabled, Roma Gypsies, some Poles, homosexuals
- 3. The "final solution" to the "Jewish problem" was the extermination of all of them in gas chambers in the concentration camps.
- 4. the deliberate killing of a particular group of people
- 5. Georgia has a Jewish community that dates to its founding in 1733. Atlanta was and is a center of Jewish culture, not only for Georgia but the entire Southeast. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Jews there had started organizations to provide social services to Jews in need, especially new immigrants, and later to Jews overseas. They also focused on fighting anti-Semitism at home.
