5.	One result of Bloody Sunday was the passage of the Voting Rights Act of Congress enacted this federal law to eliminate racial discrimination in voting. The law prohibited voting practices, granted the federal government oversight of elections in states with a history of discrimination, and led to a significant increase in black voter registration and participation.			
6.	5. One strong opponent of civil rights in Georgia was Lester Maddox, the owner of the Pickrick Restaurant near Georgia Tech in Atlanta. He opened the diner in 1947 and became well known for his			
7.	7. Although Maddox closed his restaurant, his opposition to civil rights gained hir political support among white voters who resisted Maddox served as from 1967 to 1971. He remained an outspoken opponent of civil rights and used his time in office to resist policies that promoted integration.			
8.	In the years following the passage of the Voting Rights Act, Dr. King and the SCLC aimed to eliminate among individuals of all races. They planned a Poor People's Campaign in November 1967, culminating in a major, demonstration during the summer of 1968.			
9.	King's plans for a Poor People's March were interrupted in the spring of 1968 by a trip to Memphis, Tennessee, to support a by the city's sanitation workers. On April 4, 1968, while King was on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel, a sniper shot and killed him. The shock of the tragic murder of Dr. King was felt around the world. King's funeral on April 9, 1968, in Atlanta, drew over mourners. This tremendous outpouring of grief and respect highlighted the profound influence of this remarkable leader.
