## Part I: State Population

Go to <u>United States Census Data: Missouri</u>. See how the data are organized. Years are at the top of columns. Each row stands for the national, state, or county population. You will have to scroll down to the bottom of the page to see more years. When you write your answers, be sure to put commas in the correct places for place value!

- 1. What was the population of Missouri in 1990?
- 2. What was the population of Missouri in 1900?
- 3. By how much did Missouri's population increase between 1900 and 1990?

## Part II: Urban vs. Rural

Another way to look at population is to see how the population changed from rural to urban. Use this link for your data: <u>United State Urban and Rural Population</u>.
