Introduction

 Alabama has many men and women who are respected lawmakers, political leaders, and jurists (judges).
They have been important to our state and nation.



Political Leaders

- James Elisha Folsom: a.k.a. "Big Jim" was elected governor twice. Known for paving rural roads, increasing the school year, and improving schools.
- Pattie Ruffner Jacobs: women's suffrage leader and worked to end convict-leasing.
- Thomas Erby Kilby: Worked to pay state debts and improve schools and prisons.



Political Leaders

- Condoleeza Rice: served as national security advisor and U.S. Secretary of State.
- George C. Wallace: served as governor four times and also ran for president. He was shot and became a paraplegic.
- Lurleen Burns Wallace: first female governor of Alabama.



Lawmakers

The Bankheads: three in the same family who served in Congress (<u>John Hollis</u>; <u>John Hollis II</u>; <u>William B</u>.).

- Tom Bevill: congressman for 30 years and led the drive to build the Tenn-Tom Waterway and I-22.
- J. Lister Hill: long-time congressman and senator, known for improving hospitals and expanding electric use, telephones, housing, and education.



Lawmakers

John J. Sparkman: congressman who fought for the building of the Redstone Arsenal and making laws to support military service people and veterans.



Jurists

- Oscar W. Adams: first black Alabama Supreme Court justice.
- Hugo L. Black: U.S. Supreme Court justice.
- Howell T. Heflin: Alabama Supreme Court chief justice and U.S. senator known for supporting civil rights.

Businesspeople

Many Alabamians have become successful entrepreneurs.

- Winton "Red" Blount: built a large construction company and donated millions of dollars to charities in Alabama.
- Emory O. Cunningham: publisher of magazines and cookbooks.
- John H. "Red" Dove: built a family-owned trucking business.



Businesspeople

- Arthur G. Gaston: black man who built insurance, broadcasting, and banking businesses.
- Reverend William R. Pettiford: built largest African American-owned bank.
- Mark C. Smith: founder of technology companies.
- E. B. Stephens: founded the large EBSCO company.
- Diane Weston: her company does technology research for NASA.



Educators

- > Alabama has many wonderful educators who make a difference in people's lives.
- Marva Collins: opened her own school in Chicago to help students who had trouble learning.
- Julia Strudwick Tutwiler: worked to educate women and prisoners who lacked job skills.
- Dr. George Washington Carver: did research on plants and scientific methods for farming; he became a famous teacher at the Tuskegee Institute.



Scientists

- Scientists help improve people's lives studying things like medicine, space, plants, animals, atoms, and more!
- Dr. Percy Julian: created new products from soybeans and invented a drug to treat arthritis.
- Dr. Robert Van de Graaff: built the world's first atom smasher.
- Dr. Edward O. Wilson: studied how ants and bees live and work together.
- Dr. Werner von Braun: helped build America's space program and supported education in his community.



Scientists

- Several astronauts have come from Alabama. They have served as mission specialists and commanders of space missions.
- Four surgeons general have been from Alabama. They have helped presidents improve the health of all Americans.

Entertainers

- Many entertainers are from Alabama. One of the most famous is the country music group "Alabama."
- Jimmy Buffet: musician famous for his "parrothead" fans; also known for supporting the communities of the Gulf Coast.
- Nat "King" Cole: famous jazz pianist who produced many records.
- Taylor Hicks: famous musician and American Idol winner in 2006.



Entertainers

- Lionel Ritche: musician and singer who has won many awards.
- Ruben Studdard: singer and American Idol winner in 2003.
- Tammy Wynette: successful country music singer and musician.





Sports Stars

- Sports are popular in Alabama and the state has many famous athletes.
- Henry "Hank" Aaron: professional baseball player who hit 755 home runs.
- Charles Barkley: professional basketball player and Olympic gold medalist.
- Paul "Bear" Bryant: famous coach of the University of Alabama Crimson Tide football team.





Sports Stars

- Vonetta Jeffrey Flowers: first African American to win a gold medal at a Winter Olympics.
- Mia Hamm: star soccer player and Olympic medalist.
- Bo Jackson: has played professional basketball and football.
- Joe Lewis: world boxing champion.
- Willie Mays: record-setting professional baseball player.




Sports Stars

- Ozzie Newsome: star UA football player and later played and managed in professional football.
- Jesse Owens: Olympic track and field star.
- Catherine "Cat" Reddick Whitehill: Olympic medalist in soccer.



Writers

- Many talented writers have come from Alabama.
- Fannie Flagg: author of many books including Fried Green Tomatoes at the Whistle Stop Café; she is also an actress and TV personality.



Harper Lee: best known for the book To Kill a Mockingbird.



Writers

Heather Whitestone McCallum: author of Listening with My Heart; she lost her hearing as a child and later became Miss America.

Kathryn Tucker Windham: wrote Alabama, One Big Front Porch, and My Name is Julia; she is also a radio personality, journalist, and actor.
